

Diavik funding programs

The <u>Diavik Diamond Mine</u> has a number of upcoming deadlines for its community contribution program.

- The Community Champions Grant provides \$2,000 to successful organizations' sport, art, recreation or cultural initiatives. The deadline to apply is March 11, 2016.
- The Community Safety Grant has the same deadline. Two \$5,000 grants will be awarded to promote safer communities.
- One \$25,000 annual Healthy School Grant will be awarded to a school's health, wellness or academic initiatives. The deadline to apply is April 1, 2016
- Through Diamonds for Dollars the company provides a polished diamond for a fundraising initative. Apply by April 1, 2016.

Diavik also has scholarships and a program to match money raised by employees.
