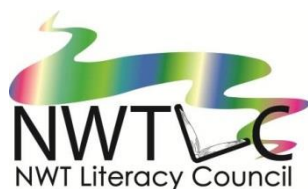

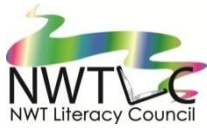

Burt Award for First Nations, Métis and Inuit Literature

The [Burt Award](#) is given annually to English-language literary works for young adults written by First Nations, Métis or Inuit authors. The first prize is \$12,000. The deadline to apply is February 15, 2015.

Early childhood staff grants now available

People working in licensed day care centres can apply now for the Early Childhood Staff Grant. The [NWT Education, Culture and Employment](#) fund is meant to increase the number of qualified early childhood professionals working in licensed centres. You can apply until April 10, 2015.

Small grants for emerging northern writers and artists

The [Emerging Northern Writers and Artists Fund](#) gives small grants of \$600 to independent northern writers and artists whose work may not otherwise appear in Northern Public Affairs magazine. The fund supports all kinds of writing and artistic expression: essays, short fiction, poetry, and visual arts on a variety of themes. The open call for applications ends February 28, 2015.
