

Ken Latour, President

Ken Latour has been a member of the NWT Literacy Council since 2015 and is the current President. It is a position he is honoured to hold and reflects his lifelong interest in education, and his belief in the importance of literacy as a key pillar for a healthy and happy life.

Ken was born in Tuktoyaktuk and migrated all the way south with his family to Hay River when he was still an infant. He attended high school in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and then earned a BA in Anthropology from Princeton University. After a stint teaching English as a Second Language in Indonesia, Ken returned to the North and took a position as an adult educator for Aurora College in Fort Resolution. After five fulfilling years there, Ken returned to his hometown of Hay River and still lives there with his wife, Kate, and his seven-year-old child, Soren.

Ken now works as a Regional Program Head for Aurora College. The position allows him to support the work of adult educators in communities and to continue to explore how literacy, education and training can improve people's lives. Ken enjoys spending time with his family, being outside as much as possible, lifelong reading and learning, and simply being alive in a beautiful place in an interesting time.
