Call for Expression of Interest - Unique opportunity for two Inuvik youth

The Town of Inuvik is looking for <u>Expressions of Interest</u> for an opportunity for two Inuvik youth (and their parent or designated chaperone) ages 12 to 18 for a unique travel and learning opportunity. The trip will take place February 26 to March 3, 2020, with the youth travelling from Inuvik to Vancouver to act as cultural and brand ambassadors for the Town of Inuvik. Encounters with Canada program

Encounters With Canada is a unique opportunity for Canadian teens to meet other young people from across the country. The students spend an adventure-filled week in Ottawa, while exploring future career options and discovering our country. For 37 years, Encounters With Canada has delivered a rich and varied bilingual program. The program costs \$750 for the full week, covering travel, accommodation, meals and all program costs - activities, visits and tours. Additionally, there are needs-based bursaries available. Encounters With Canada is currently offering a special rebate of \$100 for new participants who register by March 13, 2020. The rebate is limited and applies to remaining spots on a first come, first served basis.
