Energy Efficiency Incentive Program

The <u>Arctic Energy Alliance</u> provides rebates to northerners who purchase new, more energy-efficient models of products that they use every day. The program can be accessed by individuals, non-profits, municipalities, businesses and First Nations.

Funding for food security

The <u>Feed Opportunity Fund</u> provides grants to test and expand innovative approaches to advance food security. There is a two-step application process – Letters of Intent are due on November 14, 2018. Following review of these letters, some groups will be invited to submit a proposal by January 11, 2019.

Board member wins contest with new children's book
