

Coleen Hardisty, Youth Literacy Coordinator

Coleen has been at the NWT Literacy Council for just over a year. Her main responsibility is the Skill Builders for Youth (SBY) program, which funds projects that foster development of youth literacy and essential skills (see more details above). Coleen is coordinating Indigenous Languages Month (ILM) for a second year, in partnership with the GNWT - Indigenous Languages and Education Secretariat. ILM will take place online all month in February 2021.

As part of her professional development, Coleen was fortunate to attend Dechinta Centre for Research and Learning this fall. Coleen and the NWTLC believe Indigenous languages and cultures to be fundamental literacies of the north, and have been involved with Indigenous Evaluation facilitated by Hotil ts'eeda for the SBY program.

Coleen loves to play music and spend time on the land. She volunteers regularly at the Rainbow Coalition of Yellowknife Youth Centre, and is the facilitator for a new program starting today. The program is called Tea & Social and is for Two Spirit and Indigiqueer youth aged 30 and under.
