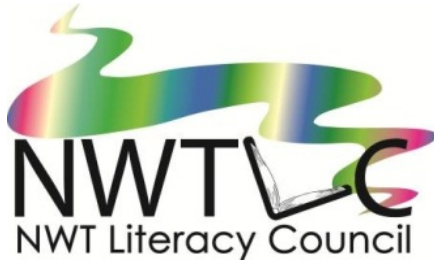

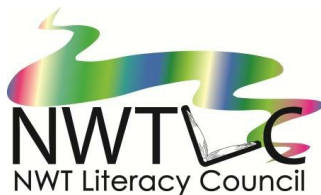
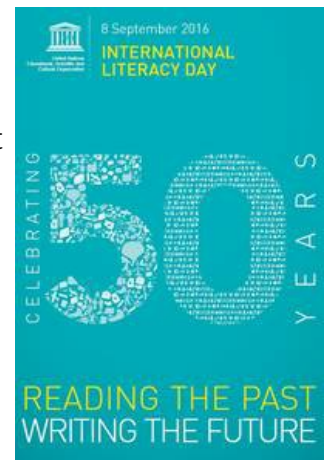

We're the family, youth and adult literacy and essential skills centre for excellence.

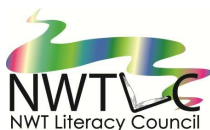
