Updated family literacy information online

You can now register for our annual [Family Literacy Training Institute](#) November 27-30, 2017. We've also updated our application and reporting forms for [family literacy funding](#). The Literacy Council funds people who have taken our training to hold family literacy activities in NWT communities.

Samara encourages political involvement and civic engagement. It is accepting nominations for its fifth annual [Everyday Political Citizen](#) contest, which highlights Canadians who engage with their communities to create a stronger more inclusive democracy.

It's scholarship season

Keep your ears and eyes open for scholarships at this time of year. Most are for post-secondary students, but the [Horatio Alger Society](#) awards need-based scholarships of up to \$10,000 to full-time students in their last year of high school. They must have a family income under \$65,000, have overcome adversity, and show a commitment to going on to post-secondary education. The deadline to apply is October 25, 2017.

Funding

NWT Literacy Week funding for events

For the first time the [NWT Literacy Council](#) offers up to \$300 to help pay for an event during NWT Literacy Week. The money is to help pay for a physical literacy event. Grants are on a first-come, first-served basis.

NWT arts funding open for applications

The [NWT Arts Council](#) funds artists or territorial organizations who produce specific artistic works, projects or events in the NWT between between April 2018 and March 2019. The next closing date for applications is October 31, 2017.

Funding for physical activity

The NWT Department of Municipal and Community Affairs provides [Active After School](#) funding for physical activities after school. The NWT Recreation and Parks Association is accepting applications for [Get Active](#) grants. These grants are for community events that get people more physically active in the NWT, especially during the winter months. You can also get help to run an [Elders in Motion](#) program in your community.
